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

One day, she finally decides never to see Gandom again. Eight years on, that decision is affecting her life. I'm Probably Lost tells the story of two girls who become friends despite their starkly different personalities. One is full of energy and passion while the other is constantly battling societal norms and prohibitions.



annaz is a young girl who has arrived in Tehran with her mother from a small town to study law. On their way to a suburban district to apply for university, the pair's money is stolen. Tannaz's mother had worked hard to earn the money her daughter needed and now, unable to pay the university fee. they have no choice but to return to Tehran. There, they decide to visit friends, an old and lonely couple, Mr and Mrs Torabi. Mrs Torabi wants Tannaz to stay and pleads with her mother to give permission. Soon, she finds Tannaz a job in a beauty salon. Mr Torabi, who suffers from an incurable disease, is on the verge of death. His only wish is to experience youthful pleasure one last time before his death. The young girl's presence provides him with the perfect opportunity. Mr Torabi tells Tannaz he is prepared to pay for anything she needs if she agrees to marry him temporarily. For Tannaz, the tempting offer presents a moral dilemma. It is in the beauty salon that the women's endless stories serve as Tannaz's escape from the unpleasant situation at home.

In Dash, Aylin, Maahmonir Kahbasi has managed to portray how middle class ennui engenders depression in Iranian women, depriving them of the means to change harmful situations.

ash, Aylin is a brief look into the life of a woman called Mehrangiz. The story begins with an allfemale evening party in Mehrangiz's home. For the women, the regular get-togethers that involve a lot of over turned coffee cups, serve as an escape from their monotonous lives. Mehrangiz is infertile and her relationship with her husband is on a downward course. Mehrangiz's mother, who suffers from Alzheimer's disease, spends her days as still as a statue and her sister, who has lost her husband and child in an accident, is severely depressed. Mehrangiz has taken both of them in and spends all of her time taking care of them. Her husband, who is a psychiatrist is exasperated with the condition at home and seeks solace in his female patients. One of Mehrangiz's friends called Aylin frequents her husband's office, claiming she wants to treat her depression. The ensuing relationship starts to affect Mehrangiz's family life.

 $m{C}$ ima, the narrator of Roya Shakibaei's novel, *The* Color of Blood travels to Kabul as an employee of an international organization. But the trip to war-torn Afghanistan is really Sima's escape from her problems in Tehran and a failed relationship. As soon as she's in Kabul, Sima comes face to face with a mountain of problems. She faces the huge responsibility of organizing the chaotic situation in her office and developing a healthy relationship with her colleagues while coming to terms with life in a war-stricken city. Many of the local Afghans are pleased to see a woman from a neighbouring country that shares the same language with them. The many cultural similarities between Iran and Afghanistan mean people trust her more readily. Sima's familiarity with the English language also allows her to act as a bridge between the Afghans and westerners. But tragedies and conflicts seem unending in a country like Afghanistan and Sima soon faces some serious challenges that threaten to force her out of the country. Amidst all the commotion though, Sima feels the weight of a new love in her heart.







Mona and Shahriar soon fall in love but the young girl has to become a Muslim in order to marry the man she loves. Facing a difficult dilemma, Mona finally chooses to change her religion and marry Shahriar. She is disowned by her family, but life has shown Mona its loving side and she looks forward to the bright and happy days ahead. Can she rely on love alone to bear the separation from her family and the sense of loss following her conversion? The author maintains an impartial perspective as she describes a Jewish family and its traditions and the way Jews relate with Muslims. The story is told through a stream of consciousness mode in a language that flows effortlessly.

Kimia is an aristocratic girl who lives with her mother and younger brother after the death of her father. When her mother marries Rumi, the greatest mystic scholar of the time, she feels even lonelier. She finds it hard to leave their mansion and its occupants behind and take up residence with strangers whose faith and understanding of life are different from hers. But the close relationship she develops with the youngest son of Rumi injects energy and joy back into her life and helps her savor the sweet fruit of a forbidden love. Kimia is now a beautiful girl whose sweet dreams are shattered by a nightmare:her stepfather, the most prominent scientist and religious leader of his time, ditches his wealth, social status and lovely wife in favor of a mystic figure called Shams. No one understands the true nature of Rumi's love for Shams who in turn falls in love with Kimia at first sight and asks for her hand in marriage. 


The author recounts how Iran's oil-rich regions suddenly became a battleground for colonial powers that sought bigger profits at the cost of human lives.

In her book Hallway to Paradise, Nazi Safavi turns an everyday topic into a gripping and strikingly distinctive novel that has captured the imagination of a growing number of Iranian readers.

ahnaz, the only daughter of a traditional **I** aristocratic family, is engaged to her childhood friend Mohammad at the age of 16. The couple begin an affectionate relationship. Mahnaz believes she has everything a girl needs to be happy: beauty, a supportive family, an intelligent fiancé who loves her and in-laws that treat her as one of their own. What she fails to understand is that love is like a flower that needs constant care and attention and even sacrifice to stay alive. Soon after the engagement, the first signs of conflict emerge. The disagreements seem petty but Mahnaz's naivety, false pride and selfishness turn them into serious sources of tension. Instead of looking for a solution and seeking advice, she continues her childish behaviour, driving Mohammad to his wits' end. The couple finally separate and after a while, Mahnaz is admitted into university. The different atmosphere and her new friendships transform Mahnaz's personality. She starts to rediscover herself and gains a sense of self-confidence she's never had before. Mahnaz also discovers that she is still in love with Mohammad. 





nce More, the Town that I Loved is a complicated love story between a teenage boy and a teenage girl from two completely contrasting social backgrounds that ends in desolation. The love story takes place in a dream-like atmosphere; its images are surreal, emerging from behind a thick mist; sometimes they can be seen and sometimes they hide from view. After being all alone for years the protagonist of the book returns to the town he loves only to find out that the beauty and serenity of the past are nowhere to be found. Years of which integrity, innocence and youthful tenderness were a hallmark are all gone. Civilization has transformed everything, and in some cases wreaked havoc on the town. The language of the novel is poetic and full of memorable sentences and metaphors; its central theme is what it means to love.

Nader Ebrahimi (1936-2008) is a well-known and prolific Iranian author, filmmaker and Iranologist. He started to write as a sixteen year old, studying English Language and Literature at university. His first work A House for the Night was published in 1963 and turned out to be a huge success. Ebrahimi has published over one hundred titles during his lifetime. Ebrahimi has received a series of awards including the Bratislava First Prize, Iran's Book of the Year Prize in 1970, and the UNESCO Prize for Education. He was also entitled Outstanding Author in 20 Years of Post-Revolution Fiction for his novel Fire without Smoke.

Combining fairytales with science fiction and actual events, Taghizadeh pulls his readers into an amazingly fluid fantasy world.

n an old school warehouse that now looks more like a dungeon, Hadi meets two strange creatures: Ismag, a wizard who's a combination of man and three horse breeds and has been sent to earth through a peculiar type of magic, and Ghasem, a talking cat. Ismag has an extremely valuable and sought-after possession called Martha's Fourth Image. Milos, the prince of Opticophil has travelled to earth to find the Image and save his planet. He meets Hadi, Ismag and Ghasem. Meanwhile, Martha's Fourth Image suddenly disappears and Lieutenant Sarvghadam, a retired detective steps in to help find it. The five characters develop a close friendship and after several years finally pursue their separate paths. They agree to meet again at a certain date in a particular hotel. Fourteen years on, they meet up and share their stories. Now, years since those events, Hadi is telling his daughter about the strange and unbelievable adventures he's had, revealing the fate of Martha's Fourth Image. In his novel, *The Cat Graph*, Hadi Taghizadeh incorporates 65 secondary narratives into his main storyline with characters that are both unique and brilliantly enchanting.




Hadi Taghizadeh, born in 1970 in Mashad, Iran, started his literary activity as a 15-year-old and wrote his first story at the age of 20. His short stories were later collected in two books called *The Treatise of Return or Simeon's Revenge and* Hunting Angels. His first novel Good Night, Sultan is about a fictitious country called Bilaji with clear resemblances to Iran. Hadi's second novel *The Cat Graph* was published in 2012 and awarded the 10th Vav Literary Award for the most distinctive work of fiction in 2013. His most recent work, Water Pressure on Delco's Strange Life, was published in 2014.

The Spell Chanted by Lambs


This novel is a portrayal of immigration in middle age and its consequences, loneliness and the search for identity.

n *The Spell Chanted by Lambs* the author tells three apparently unrelated stories from various periods of his life. In the first narrative, the narrator comes from a religious family and his father works as a labourer in the National Iranian Oil Company in the southern oilrich city of Abadan His early years are spent in a poor Abadan neighbourhood where ignorance, poverty and prejudice become the causes of some harrowing events. These events play an influential role in the narrator's life well until he becomes a middle-aged man. The next story concerns the succeeding years when the narrator is attempting to construct his fortieth Setar, a traditional musical instrument. This proves to be an almost magical moment that has come after much suffering. The final story is about an operation on the narrator's eyes and includes his monologues in hospital. In the end, the author artistically weaves these separate narratives into a single story. The Spell Chanted by Lambs is like watching several different films about a person's life in a nonlinear fashion. 
A Star Called Giant
